The existing slab became the foundation for a deck of merbau. Warner ran the timber in the same direction and at the same level as the interior floorboards, creating a seamless transition. The courtvard walls were rendered and painted. then softened with a scented pandorea climber trailing along stainless steel wires. Built-in bench seats provide a place for guests to relax with a drink.

Warner painted the old garage with a patterned steel screen that can be slid out of the way. The water feature can be taken away to make extra room when required.
